## **<u>1. What do you feel are the Irish yatra's greatest current STRENGTHS?</u></u>**

## **<u>2. What do you feel are the Irish yatra's greatest current WEAKNESSES?</u></u>**

1. The main weakness in the yatra is in the way things are being run by the supposed leaders and management, who are failing to bring the devotees together. There is a lack of unity between the devotees. There are many devotees who do not feel welcome in the temples due to personal differences and objections to the current managers.

Far from encouraging unity, enthusiasm, and discourse, the current manager/GBC has encouraged/caused divisiveness in our community, as there are many, many devotees on the sidelines who never come to temples because they have such a problem with the ways things are being run, but are unable to speak out. This is another huge weakness with the ways things are being run – not only is there no forum for feedback on the running of our community and our temples, but it is actively discouraged and greeted with aggression, threats and even blackmail. The current mood is to toe the line and not mess with the status quo, for fear of retribution or that "the plug will be pulled" by the man who has control of all the reins, finances and assets.

This is yet another very serious weakness with the ways things are being run – There appears to be one man – the GBC, Pragosa – who has complete autocratic control over the finances and assets of ISKCON yet he does not and will not disclose any of the financial accounts or decision-making. Not only is this blatantly illegal, as ISKCON is a registered charity, and therefore a threat to the continued existence of ISKCON (all it takes is one disillusioned individual to invite a government audit to have the whole thing shut down) but it greatly damages the morale of workers, managers and devotees who visit the temple. There are so many devotees who have worked and are working so hard to provide the current temple and restaurants in Dublin, but there is a sense that everything could just disappear overnight – noone has a clue of the current financial situation, even though they want to help and do something about it.

The fact is that the current GBC Pragosa has absolutely no personal relationship with any of the current devotees or congregation, he never attends any programs or gatherings unless to give class or show a Swami around and take credit for everything. Pragosa in fact had nothing to do with the development of the temple – which is why other devotees on their own volition, got together, fundraised, and physically put it together. However as soon as anyone oversteps the line and dares to criticise Pragosa, they're demonised and ejected.

Pragosa as the figurative GBC head of ISKCON Ireland is in itself actually causing huge divisiveness in our community. This does not mean he cannot be a good manager or a good leader – however to be those things he has to develop a relationship with the people he's meant to be leading and managing, and actively take an interest in improving things for the devotees. Perhaps he should not be GBC for so many countries and become more in touch with the devotees he's meant to be representing.

No-one in Ireland knows the purpose of the GBC or what his role is meant to be. No-one feels represented by the current system of management. At the moment we seem to have neither autocratic rule from a centralised GBC (as the GBC were rightly hesitant to get involved in local matters) OR an elective representative system, but an autocratic middle management with no accountability to either the GBC or the devotees. Disillusionment with this dysfunctional lack of transparency also puts many devotees, old a new, off involvement with the structural and political side of ISKCON, and unfortunately this can also include the temples.

Due to all of the above we are not making full use of the amazing assets we have, namely the

temples and all the devotees. There is also a lack on integration between the temples and the restaurants. It is as if they are being run in competition with each other.

Despite all I've said above, I am also aware that it is easy to demonise one person and pin the blame elsewhere. I feel a very large weakness in the Irish yatra is the lack of responsibility we take for it as individuals. If we were able to stand up for what we believe and be intolerant of injustice, many of the failings I have described above would never have happened. There is a mood in the yatra of sitting back and complaining when someone does something we don't like. While ultimately the responsibility does lie with leaders and managers to facilitate and create a nice mood in the yatra, I feel it is also up to those-in-the-know to take action when they see wrong. In part this is due to a feeling that it's impossible to bring about change – but I am heartened to see so many devotees getting involved in the recent istagosthi and taking an interest in the health of our community and the devotees.

8. ISKCON today is a hierarchical, non-democratic institution, and the Irish Yatra, as part of this institution, reflects this situation. As the current system dictates that all geographical areas should be overseen by a GBC member, it would seem logical that this position should be occupied by someone of unquestionable motivation; someone capable of bringing together those interested in, and trying to practise spiritual life; someone whose motivation and enthusiasm stems from a

profound desire to serve Krsna and to encourage others, from whatever background, to join in doing the same, to develop warm friendships and to get involved in spiritual life, to whatever degree and level of commitment they feel they wish.

However I feel there are currently problems in several areas, and I will mention for example two categories where there is a definite need for immediate change:

#### Exclusions and divisiveness:

The Irish Yatra has a long and unfortunate history of division among the congregation, arising from one person's desire for power and control. This was fostered for many years under the leadership of Prthu, where individuals who found themselves in favour (for supporting Prthu and his plans), were welcome to take part in the Irish Yatra's activities. However those who were out of favour, due to what Prthu saw as questionable loyalty to him personally, were unwelcome in the temples and at festivals. This brought about great heartache among the congregation, as individuals had to weigh up their loyalty to Prthu (and thus their permission to participate in the Irish Yatra), against personal relationships.

It was to be hoped that after many years of this situation, we might have the good fortune to have someone who would bring people together, with an emphasis on repairing relationships which had been damaged under Prthu's leadership. What we do not need is a further expression of control or power being in the hands of one individual. What we do desperately need in Ireland is a mood of open friendship where the congregation can be mutually supportive and welcoming.

However, what we have instead is another era of divisiveness. Some of those who feel they have control of certain buildings or festivals, have again been welcoming and excluding individuals, making such decisions on the basis of perceived loyalty to the current hierarchy, headed by the GBC for Ireland. This is an incredibly unspiritual atmosphere to cultivate, more akin to medieval feudalism, than to what is desirable in a place or circumstance for worshipping Krsna.

The temple is surely a "church", open to anyone to enter and take part in, or listen to, programmes, festivals, acts of worship, and a place to develop meaningful friendships etc. It is surely a location for the bringing together of disparate souls. However more and more I am hearing of individuals being asked to leave temple premises, and even a public street festival, not because they are acting offensively/ violently/ antagonistically; but simply because they practise a different flavour (therefore seen as the wrong flavour) of Krsna consciousness, or are not perceived to be sufficiently loyal to the current hierarchy.

Financial arrangements and accountability:

The present modus operandi for a GBC does not seem to require openness of accountability to the ISKCON congregation of his area. As far as I am aware, the present GBC for Ireland has no requirement to reveal his, or his family's income from ISKCON, ISKCON projects or the Irish Yatra, through salary, expenses, perks of office or other financial benefits. Under the current situation the GBC appears to have total access to all ISKCON finances, accounting and financial decision-making in his area, and has authority to make financial decisions privately, on ISKCON's behalf, regarding his own and his family's income from ISKCON and ISKCON projects in his area. Surely this is a very dubious situation, open to exploitation. As ISKCON is both a religious institution and a registered charity, I find this surprising and thoroughly unhealthy.

I moved into an ISKCON temple in Ireland in 1984, and have consequently known Pragosa, the current GBC for Ireland, for a long time. I have been resident in temples where he was Temple

President and lived for many years in a rural community of five families, including his and my own.

Pragosa is obviously an intelligent and articulate person, and also obviously I am not questioning his personal devotion to Krsna or Prabhupada; however I feel that he is not the right person for the role of GBC for Ireland.

This is because I regard him as not only an intelligent and articulate person, but also a skilled and artful politician; successful in influencing people and situations to his own advantage. Pragosa's wife told me many years ago that he was keeping records on file about others, including friends, with a view to being able to use the information in the future. However he was generally secretive and obfuscating regarding his own affairs, and encouraged his family to behave in a similar manner. It was clear to me that he liked and aimed to be in charge, and knew how to keep his position by encouraging (and sometimes causing) divisiveness among those he sought to control. This is how I experienced him operating over many years, and I am not convinced that there has been any change in his motivation since his appointment as a GBC member.

I therefore found it surprising, and disappointing, that those who had the power to choose who should be GBC for Ireland, decided that Pragosa would be the best candidate for this position of spiritual authority, care of the congregation and overseeing of the Irish Yatra. Tue, Oct 5, 2010 6:41 AM

Janmastami Dasa (a youth in the yatra) took on the project of building the Dublin temple and spent every minute he wasn't in work slaving over every detail of the temple to ensure it was completed to perfection. Despite being extremely busy with his home/work life, he made sure that all the temple programs were organised and run smoothly and that people were aware of the temple. It was also Janmastami who brought the return of the Rathayatras in Dublin, which is a highlight in the year. Thanks to his determination and sincere interest in the temples growth and his inclusive mood, Dublin now has a beautifully constructed temple and annual Rathayatras. However, he was recently asked to step down from his managerial, organisational and all other duties with the temple due to a power driven command by a "high up" individual which was immediately accepted and not questioned by any other senior devotee despite the majority feeling that injustice was taking place. What happened to being humbler than the blade of grass on the street?

3. There is currently little/ no interest in encouraging the youth to attend the temple more often. So much of the philosophy is very interesting but it can be discussed in a fairly dull way in classes. 4. The supportive community aspect of the Irish yatra seems to be almost completely non-existent. Families and individuals are tending to move away from the temples and practice their own worship in the home. This is the case for me and I prefer it this way at the moment because I know I can really focus on the lovely parts of Krsna consciousness and forget about all the politics, misinterpretations and expectations that I feel are inflicted on me when attend the temple. I know this is how most people feel who currently don't attend the temple.

5.Children do not have a place at all in the Dublin or Belfast temple at the moment. I think some of the parents have created a Sunday school on Inis Rath; however, this is not the case in any of the other temples.

# **3. What practical improvements would you most like to see made in the Irish** <u>yatra?</u>

1. I would like, and I believe it is fundamental and necessary for the future of ISKCON, to be able to see full financial and managerial transparency, and a relationship between the community and the management.

There should be a statement on the role of the GBC in this country, as it very unclear. GBC/managers should connect with the community, hold regular istagosthis and invite feedback and involvement from ALL the devotees where they can speak openly and honestly without fear of retribution. The recent istagosthi, which was very positive and inspiring, was in fact held DESPITE the GBC, as Pragosa attempted to stop it from happening and made sure he was "unable" to attend. If he wishes to be a manager and a leader he needs to get over his mistrust of people and actually connect with them, if not we need a new representative who engages with all the community, not just the core subordinates.

All devotees should feel equally welcome in the temple, and that they have equal status as contributing members of the congregation. At the moment it feels like "you're in you're out". I would like to see all visitors to temple, of any age, gender, race, ISKCON seniority or regularity of attendance be equally valued by the community and management and be invited to honestly contribute our thoughts feelings and actions towards developing the community in Krishna Consciousness in whatever way we are individually inclined or capable. If we are able to be honest with each other we will be able to form real friendships and be able to connect with each other in a meaningful way to create a strong and real sense of inclusiveness, warmth and community.

On a practical level, the publishing of weekly/monthly email newsletters, or even a proper website, to let everyone know about upcoming events, istagosthis or festivals would help everyone stay connected as not everyone is able to attend the temple regularly due to distance or commitments. Surveys like this one are an excellent idea, and they should be ongoing.

Home programs should also be encouraged – however not as an alternative to the temple because the devotees do not feel welcome. We should be making full use of the amazing temples that we have, which have been created and maintained by devotees for so long. We should see the temples as belonging to Krishna and all the devotees who want to get to know Krishna, rather than belonging to a manager or temple president.

We must take steps to unite all of the amazing devotees we have rather than neglect them to focus on making "new" devotees – as if we have inherent problems in our structure and community it will be only a matter of time until these "new" devotees will understand the situation and become disillusioned.

The Irish and UK political scenes have been rocked, in recent years, by revelations of financial scandals and outrageous financial arrangements. There is huge outrage among the general population that public representatives are able to decide their own inflated salaries (which come from public funds), and that there has been enormous exploitation of expenses claims, and employment of relatives, also paid from public funds. I am sorry to say that I see a potential parallel with ISKCON GBC financial arrangements, a perception which cannot at present be dispelled, due to the level of secrecy surrounding the subject.

Furthermore, I think there should be a requirement for ALL ISKCON personnel who receive money from ISKCON or Irish Yatra funds, or who receive money from ISKCON projects, to have their income details made available to the body of devotees.

If everything is fair and just, then there can be no problem with this information being made public. However until this is done, I, for one, remain deeply suspicious that this situation is being exploited for financial gain.

The next step is for those who are in charge of the management/running of the temples to really listen and take on board what the devotees are saying and to take positive steps to ensuring a more inclusive temple environment, which focuses on the essence of Krsna consciousness and avoids all the politics.

5.It would be great, if there was enough parents/children interested, to have a set Sunday school for children which could include stories of Krsna as well as other arts and crafts to make the children feel that they have a place in the temple and something to look forward to. If space was available and enough children interested, I could teach dance and even drama to the children, which could then be performed for the devotees. Right now, I don't feel inclined to volunteer this due to my experience of how people are being treated in the temple. However, if this was to be resolved/improved I would definitely consider offering to take this on.

6.Some options to add more interest could include: dance/drama performances, Krsna conscious bands playing in the temple, Krsna conscious movies being shown in the temple, working on projects in groups, day trips out to natural settings (e.g. mountain trips, hikes, bonfires with storytelling, bhajans, kirtans, etc.)...
